'Quicker access, better survivability:' EMS reminding rural Manitobans about importance of AEDs

With cuts coming to rural Manitoba's Emergency Medical Service stations, emergency responders are urging the importance of a tool that could save a life.

An Automated External Defibrillator, or an AED, could mean the difference between life and death.

Last month, the province announced it would be shutting down 18 different EMS stations in rural Manitoba. This has left some emergency responders fearful of what's to come to those who need their help in rural parts of the province.

"In rural Manitoba it's not out of the norm to have an hour or greater response times. So, you need that AED to save that person's life," Alex Forrest with the United Firefighters of Winnipeg said.

Forrest said it's important for rural families to start considering the importance of an AED nearby at a community centre, or even at home.

The little box like device can be bought in an emergency supplies store. It can be used to send a shock to someone's heart to try and restore it to normal rhythm in the event of a heart attack.

"[It Could] ensure that person is going to be alive for when the paramedics arrive," Forrest said.

He said with the cuts coming to rural Manitoba EMS, that could mean doubling wait times. This is why he's emphasizing the importance of the AED in helping while someone waits for a professional to arrive.

Kelcey French is a Rural Paramedic and he said he worries for the rural communities that will be cut from quick access to emergency services.

"I think as a starting point an easily accessible AED, at least one in every community, would be a good start," French said.

French said the closer a defibrillator is to a patient, and therefore the faster you use it, the better the person's chance of survival.

While an AED costs anywhere between \$1,500 to \$2,000 and may not be feasable to buy for a home, he reminds people to speak to their city councillors and community representatives to make sure one is at least near by in a public place.



Three stages of Heat Stress and how to treat them

During a heat wave, workers who stay outdoors for long periods of time during the day run the risk of succumbing to heat-related illnesses. Recognizing the signs and symptoms of heat-related illnesses is important in ensuring your workers' safety. St. John Ambulance offers the following guidelines for administering first aid for people suffering from heat stress.

Heat cramps

Painful muscle cramps primarily in the legs and abdomen and excessive sweating. This is usually caused by losing too much water and salt through sweating; usually, this is related to excessive physical activity in hot weather. They are not serious and can be reversed with some basic first aid.

First aid

Ensure the person is put at rest in a cool place and given as much water as possible in small amounts, so as not to cause nausea. If the cramps do not subside, seek medical help.

Heat exhaustion

More serious than heat cramps, the symptoms include: excessive sweating, dilated pupils, complaints of dizziness, blurred vision, headaches and cramps. The casualty may also have cool, clammy skin, a weak rapid pulse, rapid shallow breathing or vomiting and may go unconscious.

First aid

Give the casualty water to drink, as much as they will take. If they vomit, do not give them anything by mouth and seek medical attention right away. Place them at rest in the shock position in a cool place, remove any excessive clothing and loosen clothing around the neck and waist. If they go unconscious, put them in the recovery position and get medical help; continue monitoring their condition.

Heatstroke (sunstroke)

This is a life-threatening condition. Without immediate action, heatstroke can result in permanent brain damage or death. If heatstroke is suspected, seek medical attention immediately or call 9-1-1. Symptoms include a rapid and full pulse that gets weaker and harder to feel in later stages, noisy breathing, flushed skin, hot and dry skin or hot and sweaty skin (when heatstroke is related to exertion), restlessness, headache, fatigue, dizziness, nausea, vomiting, convulsions and, eventually, unconsciousness.

First aid

Call for medical assistance. It is critical that the body temperature is lowered as quickly as possible; cover them with a wet sheet and fan them, immerse them in cool (not cold) water (watch them closely for any changes) or sponge them with cool water, particularly in the armpits, neck and groin.

Worker fired for breaching policy, not over drug problem, Supreme Court rules

The Supreme Court of Canada has dismissed an appeal in a case involving an Alberta worker who was fired by a mining company after testing positive for drug use.

In an 8-1 ruling, the court says the Alberta Human Rights Tribunal was right to conclude that the man was fired for breaching the company's drug policy, not because of his addiction.

The policy, which includes support for treatment, requires employees to disclose any dependence or addiction issues before any drugrelated incident occurs.

Chief Justice Beverley McLachlin says while the employee may have been in denial about his addiction, he knew he should not take drugs before work and had the capacity to disclose his drug use to his employer.

In a dissenting opinion, Justice Clement Gascon said the employee, Ian Stewart, was terminated for giving in to his drug dependence and did not receive reasonable accommodation from the company.

The tribunal found that while the complainant's drug addiction was a disability protected under the legislation, there had been no discrimination, a finding that was upheld by lower courts.

"The Alberta Human Rights Tribunal held that Mr. Stewart was not terminated because of his addiction, but for breaching the policy, which required him to disclose his addiction or dependency before an accident occurred to avoid termination," McLachlin wrote.

She said she saw no reason to interfere with that finding.

"The tribunal's decision that prima facie discrimination was not established was reasonable," she wrote. "It is therefore unnecessary to consider whether Mr. Stewart was reasonably accommodated."
