This classification is the largest of the (18) levied classifications assigned to CSAM. Actual Payroll increased from \$633M in 2021 to \$673.2M in 2022, or an approximate 6% increase. This is quite significant given that overall payroll in the Construction Industry was relatively flat in 2022. 56% of the Actual Payroll in this classification is safety certified.

Severe Injuries dropped from (132) in 2021 to (119) in 2022. A significant finding given an increase in exposure hours. The majority (86) of the Severe Injuries took place in the Small Employer Category (Payroll less than \$750,000). The vast majority of Small Employers are not safety certified and were responsible for (75) of the Severe Injuries.

The classification paid close to \$12M in insurance premium and approximately \$1M was returned by way of rebate to Safety Certified Employer.

The classification remains in the 200% Risk Category and has shown claims costs relative to this category for a number of years.
